

6 LESSONS LEARNT FROM THE FORUM

#1: Developing a vibrant social economy will depend on the strength of collaborations and partnerships **What is needed:**

- More active dialogue between capital providers
- A platform for innovative communities to convene

#2: Unlike other markets, there stands to be more grant funding than equity available in Myanmar.

What is needed:

- More active dialogues between grant and equity providers will help the overall ecosystem develop
- Grants in Myanmar are often better funding for R&D and innovation than equity

#3: Corporations can have more systemic impact if Corporate Social Responsibility provides accountability.

What is needed:

- Measurements and impact should reflect the needs of the business
- Move away from traditional philanthropy to shared value strategies to contribute to society
- Encourage social purpose organisations to view corporations as potential partners, not just a funding source













#4: Myanmar's social economy does not have a strong grasp on the potential of social innovation and entrepreneurship.

What can be done:

- Raise awareness of the impact of digital entrepreneurship, even to last mile communities
- Investors should focus less on fast return of investments and more on investments that not only foster multi-sector collaboration but also support innovation and technology.

#5: When indigenous players are at the forefront, an entire local industry is established.

What is needed:

- Build trust across stakeholders for partnerships towards common goals
- Build social enterprise capacity to ensure gains stay within the country and are shared equitably

#6: Village communities and local social entrepreneurs have established thousands of self-financed renewable energy minigrids for energy access.

What can be done:

 Re-approaching the use of mini grids as an addition to the capacity of larger grids could result in greater impact.
